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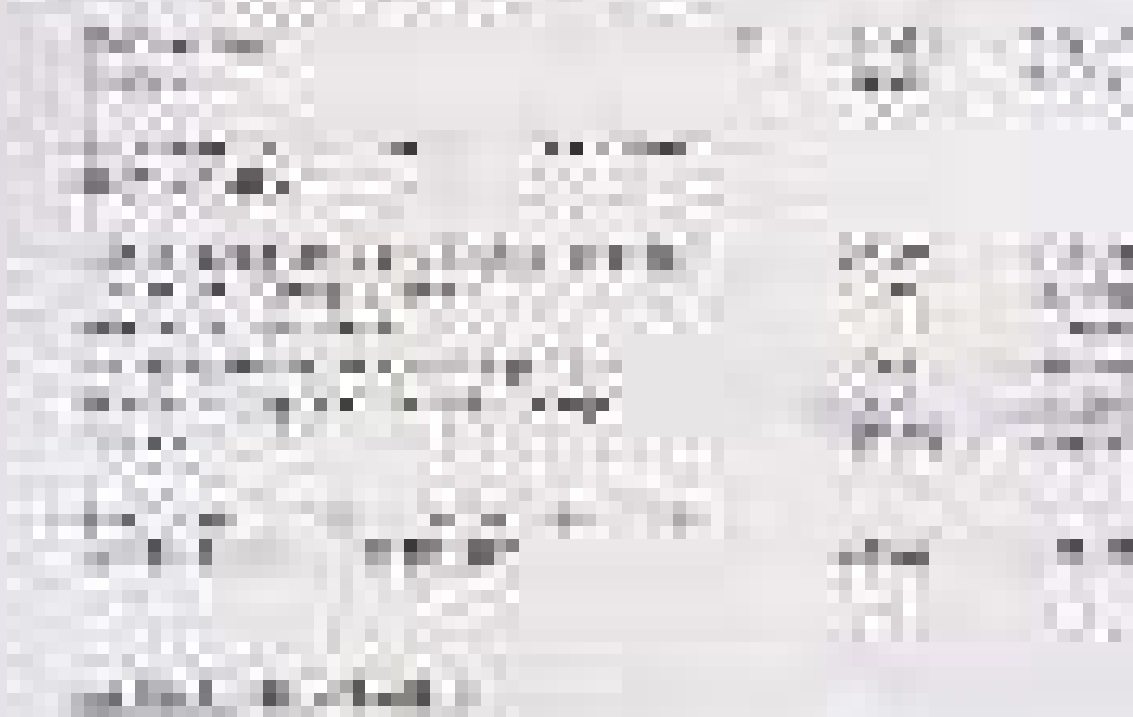

The following table shows the results of the regression analysis for the dependent variable "Number of children in the household" (N = 1,000). The independent variables are "Age of the head of household" and "Gender of the head of household". The table includes the coefficient estimates, standard errors, t-statistics, and p-values for each variable.

Variable	Coefficient	Standard Error	t-statistic	p-value
Age of the head of household	0.05	0.02	2.50	0.01
Gender of the head of household (Male = 1, Female = 0)	-0.10	0.03	-3.33	0.00
Constant	1.50	0.10	15.00	0.00

The regression results indicate that the number of children in the household is positively related to the age of the head of household and negatively related to the gender of the head of household.
