

CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS

ARTICLE 1

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1

There shall be a Senate and a House of Representatives.

- The Senate shall be composed of Senators chosen by the electors in each State in the manner provided in the Constitution of the State.

SECTION 2

The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People in the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

SECTION 3

CLAUSE 1

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be admitted into or excluded from this Union according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by the following Rule, to-wit:

1. All free Persons whose Names are in the Lists of the actual Inhabitants of each State, and all free Persons of color who, three Years before the next Enumeration, shall have been two Years in the United States, and who, on the Day of the next Enumeration, shall be free, shall be counted as Representatives or direct Taxes.

CLAUSE 2

3. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand Persons, but each State shall have at least one Representative, and until 1842, not less than two Representatives shall be appointed in every State, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to do Business, and a Majority to assent to any Bill, Resolution, or Yea-Nay Vote, and for the Purpose of choosing Speakers and Clerks.

4. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

5. No Person shall be a Representative who shall not, when elected, have seven Years in the United States, and who, when elected, shall not, when he takes the Oath of Office, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

SECTION 4

1. The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other Officers, and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

2. The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments, when sitting, and shall decide by a Majority of two-thirds.

3. The President, Vice President, and all civil Officers of the United States, Judges of the Supreme and inferior Courts, and all Officers of the United States, shall be liable to Impeachment and Removal from Office.




