

THE 1960 MEXICO CITY OLYMPICS AND THE 1964 TOKYO OLYMPICS
IN JAPAN

After the 1956 Melbourne Olympics and despite a somewhat rocky start, the 1960 Rome Olympics were considered a success. In 1964, the host city Tokyo, Japan, was chosen to host the games. The Japanese government had been instrumental in the planning and organization of the games, and the Japanese people were very enthusiastic about the games.
