John C. Scott, *Family, Social Capital, and Stratification* (New York: Routledge, 1998), pp. xii + 240, £45.00 (hardback), £14.99 (paperback).

John C. Scott's book, *Family, Social Capital, and Stratification*, is a welcome addition to the literature on social capital and stratification. It is also a welcome addition to the literature on family and social capital.

The book consists of ten chapters, plus a short introduction and a short conclusion. The introduction is brief, but it provides a clear overview of the book's main themes and arguments.
